It's that time of the year again, shorter days, dewy mornings and the leaves are falling! We'll try and keep the course as clear as possible but try keep a good image of where your ball ends up, use things in the distance to try and gauge where it is.





We are very happy with the recovery of the aprons after the over-seeding and we are seeing lots of growth. We seem to be cutting more now than we did in the summer!

You may have noticed there are ALOT of acorns this year. Every few years, some species of trees and shrubs produce a bumper crop of their fruits and nuts. The collective term for this is 'mast', so it's called a mast year. Did you know, an Oak can drop several hundred acorns in a single square metre!

It cannot be predicted when there will be a mast year but weather certainly has a part to play. Spring conditions are a factor and if the Spring is warm and dry, pollination of oak flowers is very effective and this results in a large crop of acorns.

So, as most of the acorns seem to have fallen now,

so, as most of the acorns seem to have fallen now, we will attempt to clear some areas where your ball could end up, but this has to be done by hand as no machinery we have will pick them up.



But the main focus for the next month will be clearing leaves. Please remember to repair pitchmarks and rake bunkers.
